A great education institution is not one that is not challenged, but rather one that rises to face these challenges, transforms itself to enable the social inclusion the society requires of it, and yet remains anchored in the academic excellence that has historically always defined it.

There is no better exemplar of this than Parktown Boys' High School, located opposite Wits, one of South Africa's great Universities, and remaining one of its main feeder schools for all of this century. Both enter their new century, wizened by managing recent social challenges, and full of hope for maintaining academic excellence and enabling social inclusion, necessary prerequisites for South Africa's collective success.

A. Schooling in South Africa today

South African education is in crisis. Less than half the children entering primary school end up finishing high school in the standard timeframe. Many never finish and even among those who do matriculate, the majority are poorly equipped for tertiary education or the job market.

Over the same period where academic outcomes have deteriorated, so too has the environment in which children must walk the path to adulthood. Rampant crime, unemployment, gender-based violence, substance abuse, malnutrition, xenophobia and cyber-bullying are issues most of us never had to contend with.

26,000 of the 30,000 schools in SA are state schools. Their challenges echo those of the larger society – in a world where they need to do more than ever to nurture children, their ability to do so is at a low point. With our schools placing 75th out of 76 in a 2015 OECD study, even the base numeracy and literacy outcomes are far below what is required. It is a massive concern for the future of South African society.

The 1,600 private schools cater for the wealthy. It is a privilege for parents to be able to send their children to these schools.

But this dichotomy unfortunately widens the gap between the haves and have-nots.

The 'ex-Model C' schools receive partial funding the state; the rest comes from School Fees paid by parents, overseen by School Governing Bodies (SGBs), and outside funding. At Parktown Boys' for example, the subsidy from the state pays for little more than the salaries of half of the Staff Complement – thus more than 50% of the staff are paid for by the SGB, with other costs such as security, maintenance, operations and capital expenditure also carried by the School. In addition, it is the SGB who provide the funding for skilled coaches across Culturals and Sport, to ensure we continue to offer a high quality, holistic education.

This results in higher educational standards and better facilities than most state schools. In some cases, these standards and facilities rival, and even surpass, the private schools.

Parktown Boys' High School is such a school. As has always been the case, it draws its pupils from all over Gauteng, and – with newly expanded boarding facilities – from all over the country. The School is also able to provide structure and accountability, which compromised domestic situations are not always able to do.





B. What Parktown Boys' High School represents

Parktown Boys' is seen by many as a private school; Parktown Boys' debunks the perception that it is only through choosing the independent schooling option that one is able to provide a quality education for one's children. The evidence tells a very different story.

As a flagship public boys' school, many parents choose Parktown Boys' as the school for their son, despite having the means to attend a private school. An example is previous Wits Vice Chancellor and respected educationalist, Adam Habib, who chose Parktown Boys' for his sons - both of whom excelled and went on to study internationally for postgraduate study.

They are drawn to our "Values First, Positive Attitude Second, and Commitment Third"

mantra. We are driven by our Core Value, 'Respect for All'. The students are part of a values-driven experience that produces young men of sound character, with compassion, courage and grit, who can relate to our broader social problems, have the appetite to attend to these problems and who have acquired the skills to solve them.

They learn patience, dedication, respect, brotherhood, loyalty, respect for women, tolerance for others, and cultivate an optimism born of capability and self-knowledge.

You can still feel these values when you visit the school, meet a fellow Old Boy or talk to a current teacher. It is gratifying to walk through the corridors and have every boy you pass greet you, and stand up if they are sitting down.

Headmaster, Malcolm Williams, sums it up:



As we approach "Parktown 100", our Centenary, Parktown Boys' High School continues to offer a high-quality, holistic education focused on excellence as it has done for the past 98 years. We, who carry the baton currently as the staff of the school, are proud of our heritage; we shall not be shaken from our course, of continuing to grow the values-based moral leaders of tomorrow. Student Leadership and Personal Development are key result areas for our school. We expect our Seniors to earn their respect; we expect our Juniors to give respect. Our young men are known for their excellent manners and their bearing, which reflects their strong sense of self-worth.

We are proud of our crest, our Rampant Lion and our school motto, ARISE! Our motto celebrates resilience: the 'grit' to face adversity, to dig deep and to overcome challenges. In this way our boys are prepared for life.

We are proud of our status as a Flagship Public Boys' School and being recognised as being amongst the top – public and independent – schools in the country. We have a passionate and involved Alumni Community. We expect the full involvement of our boys in Academic, Cultural and Sporting pursuits; we celebrate Excellence and Effort; we celebrate those who make the right choices and not the popular choices; we hold the boys accountable for their actions.

That's why Parktown Boys' High School is a "Great Place To Be".



C. The Parktonian Foundation

Parktown Boys' has a proud history of producing men of influence and impact, instilled with values that gear them to use their talents, skills and resources to lead positive change and to be role models that inspire others.

The Parktonian Foundation exists for that sole purpose – to raise funds to augment what is raised by the School Governing Body, and sourced from state budgets.

If we believe that producing values-based moral leaders of character is essential for the betterment of South African society, then preservation of schools like Parktown Boys' High School becomes an imperative. The hard truth: this requires additional funding.







D. Structure of the Foundation

The foundation has existed as a trust since 1978.

After the tragic passing of the Foundation Chairperson, Rob Collins, in 2021, a number of new trustees were recruited and one of our first initiatives has been to reconstitute as a Non-Profit Company ("NPC"). The reason for registering an NPC is that the administration of an NPC is simpler than a Trust – but the benefits and objectives remain the same. In many ways these steps see the long-term vision of Rob Collins as Foundation Chair coming to fruition. This registration was finalised in September 2022.

Deloitte will serve as auditors, Webber Wentzel as legal advisors, and Melville Douglas as money managers. The following directors were appointed on incorporation:

Alastair has been a member of the Parktonian Foundation since 2013. He joined after attending his 20 year reunion as he felt that the

Mark Botha (1985) entered the family Construction Business, and continues today managing a group of companies in the Real Estate and Construction industry. Brian Dennehy (1993) is a Tax Director at Webber Wentzel. As a CA(SA) specialising in private equity, M&A and corporate tax advisory, as well as structured equity and debt finance transactions.

James Wellsted (1987) joined the Foundation as a Trustee in 2018, after organising his class's 30 Year reunion and becoming aware of the school's need for support from its Old Boys. James is

His family has a long association with Parktown and he is passionate about the school and the critical role it can continue to play in developing the future leaders of South Africa.







E. A Proud Legacy

Parktown turns 100 in 2023. It has a history of producing top sportsmen, entertainers, entrepreneurs and business leaders. Moreover, the School has regularly taken the lead and been trendsetters, often as a result of facing adversity and growing through it. Evidence which reflects this includes:

- Parktown Boys' was the first previously whites-only government school in South Africa to admit a non-white pupil during the transition to democracy in 1991. We continue to celebrate our diversity as one of our great strengths; we are a truly South African School.
- More recently, in late 2018, our boys took a public stand against all forms of gender-based violenceand child abuse, holding a silent protest on Jan Smuts and Empire Rd. In addition the boys now visit Parktown Girls' on an annual basis to read out the 'Parktown Promise' at Assembly where the boys again reiterate their stand against all forms of gender-based violence and child abuse.
- The School celebrates International Men's
 Day, focusing on the importance of our
 being 'good sons, good brothers, good
 husbands and good fathers', and through
 this, rejecting all forms of toxic masculinity.

The original school buildings are a National Heritage Site.

Notable alumni include:

John Varty (1968) - Wildlife conservationist and filmmaker

Neville Berman - Captain of the South African Hockey Team which beat West Germany (World No 1 at the time) in an 8 Nations Final played at the Wanderers in 1974. He is one of a long line of Hockey Springboks, including Keith Jones, Noel Day, Kevin Rule, and more recently, Lance Louw, Miguel de Graca, Ricky West, Dylan Coombes and Justin Rosenberg. Cameron Le Forestier (2020) was selected to The SA U21 Hockey Team For 2022 and Thabang Modise

(2014) was selected For The SA Men's Hockey Team, also in 2022.

Paul Bayvel - Springbok rugby player from 1974-1976 and a winner of the 'Young Player of the Year', in 1972. Madosh Tambwe (2016), has played professional rugby for the Lions, Sharks and Bulls and won 'Back of the Year' in the 2022 URC Championship Awards. Nkosikhona Masuku (2017) was selected to represent the Junior Springbok Rugby team. Max Perks (2020) debuted for The Falcons U20 in a game against the Blue Bulls in 2022.

Trevor Rabin - Founder member of South African Band, Rabbit, and also of the internationally-acclaimed, Grammy-award winning rock band **Yes**, and prolific award-winning composer of movie scores. **Yes** were inducted into the Rock 'n Roll Hall of Fame in 2017.

Graeme Codrington (1988) – Futurist and bestselling author of *Mind The Gap*.

Wayne Ferreira - A professional tennis player with a career-best ranking of 6, and who reached the semi-final of the Australian Open and quarter-finals of both Wimbledon and the US Open.

Craig Hinds (1990) – Founding member and lead singer of popular band **Watershed**.

Bradley Carnell (1993) - Retired professional footballer, who had a successful career in Germany and represented Bafana Bafana 42 times between 1997 and 2010. Bradley still holds the record for being the youngest debutant in the PSL, making his first appearance in the top flight when he was 16 years old.

Tabraiz Shamsi (2007) - Proteas cricketer who has topped the Global T20 rankings for bowlers.

Max Chaumeton (2019) – A sub-4 minute miler, becoming the first South African to break 28 minutes for a 10km road race on home soil.

Over the past year, we are very pleased to have had **Daniel Billings (2020)**, **Dean House (2011)**



and **Dylan Cole (2010)** represent South Africa in Water Polo at Senior Level. In addition, **Junior Sibiya (2011)** is currently the SA U20 Water Polo National Coach.

Hasnayn Samrod (2019) took Silver and Bronze at the Taekwondo 'World of Champions' in two of his respective divisions.

Callan Barrell and **Cameron Taberer (Matric 2019)** were selected for the South African Schools Rowing Squad, and competed in the Junior World Championships in Tokyo, Japan, in August, 2019.

Parktown has produced many prominent business people over the years, including:

PG Group. Internationally, they formed Belron, which is a leading glass repair and replacement company operating in 34 countries. Its offshore operations became Belron, one of the world's leading vehicle glass repair and replacement companies. It operates across 34 countries on five continents.

Eric Samson (1955) was the founder of MacSteel, the world's largest privately owned steel business and a significant South African philanthropist.



Parktown Boys' contributes to the tradition of healthy schoolboy rivalry, with longstanding competitive spirit, against notable opponents like Jeppe, KES, St John's, and St Stithians. As the smallest of these schools, we have certainly punched above our weight over the years.

Our sister school, Parktown High school for Girls, also celebrates its centenary in 2023. There is a long history of friendly association, including joint dramatic productions over the years. Over the past five years relationships have been strengthened on all fronts, and we are proud of our association with Parktown High School for Girls, recognised in 2021 as the top academic public school in the country.

Parktown Boys' High School has continued to enjoy success across the board; it remains one of the flagship public boys' schools in the country, and is recognised as a centre of

On the Academic front there is good reason why Parktown Boys' is recognised each year by the University of the Witwatersrand as one of its Top Feeder Schools.

Our top students are accepted into sought-after universities, both locally and abroad, and the School regularly receives recognition at District, Provincial and National level for individual and departmental achievements.

all IEB students, public and independent);
Top 1% in the World in the American SAT
Entrance Examinations. Accepted into Stanford
University, Boston, September 2022.

Another 7 boys achieved 6 A's or more.

Parktown Boys' is consistently one of Gauteng's Top Performing Schools academically, especially in Core Mathematics and Advanced Programme Mathematics, achieving amongst the highest averages for Mathematics in the district and one of the highest distinction rates. Importantly, the School has over 77% of each Matric Group taking Core Mathematics, as opposed to Mathematical Literacy. There are few schools – public or independent – who can match this.

In addition, in external assessments like Advanced Programme Mathematics, our boys consistently achieve averages 7-10% above the IEB average, which indicates that our Academics are as good, if not better, than the vast majority of Independent Schools. Our boys also excel each year in key subjects like Information Technology (IT), and Accounting. We were the Top Accounting School in the District in 2021, for example.

In 2019, 4 students represented Parktown Boys' in the National Mintek Science Quiz - in the Team and Individual sections. Parktown Boys' placed 1st in Gauteng in the Team Event, while Mohamed Mosam placed 1st in the Individual Category, and went through to the National Finals.

Mkiva Mkiva (Gr 11 2019): Represented South Africa at Sage Entrepreneurship World Cup, in August, 2019 **(Students for the Advancement** in Global Entrepreneurship). Mkiva performed with distinction in representing his country in the US.

We are very proud of how, in recent years, our students have continued to excel in Sport and Cultural activities during and after school, as well as in areas such as Community Service and Student Leadership, including taking a stand on key social issues.

Lufuno Matsile (Matric 2020): Band Captain 2020, currently studying at Stellenbosch University, Western Cape, has had the pleasure of being featured on the latest album of Sipho 'Hotstix' Mabuse, a leading South African Jazz artist – a rare opportunity for someone who has just graduated from high school. Lufuno was scouted by Sipho Mabuse while playing for the Stellenbosch Brass Band, the Trombone Ensemble and the Jazz band.

Pallance Diadia is an award-winning actor, currently on Netflix

In Chess, Parktown Boys' were the 2019, Central Gauteng A League Winners, with the A Team enjoying an unbeaten season, triumphing over schools such as King Edward, Jeppe, Roedean and St John's.

My Life at Parktown

Coming from an underprivileged family, I spent the whole of my Grade 7 year looking for a prestigious school for high school. I remember my mom and I waiting in a long line at the Department of Education because we were alien to technology and my mom believed the old-fashioned way was best. They gave me three schools to choose from: NSA, Barnato Park and Parktown Boys' High School.

I knew I was not going to get into NSA as I am not a talented musician and I could not envision myself thriving at Barnato Park. I was left with Parktown, I took a risk and applied only at Parktown. As the saying goes "No risk, no story; no story, no glory". I was accepted into Parktown and that's when the real rollercoaster started.

I had a tough time adapting to the environment because at primary school every subject was taught in isiXhosa, including English. So it is totally correct to assume my marks were not great in the first year.

One thing I could not understand was the uniform culture. I never knew why I had to wear a blazer when it was 32 degrees blazing hot outside! But then again it all makes sense, as it promotes unity.

I had to motivate myself to be better and adapt to my environment. In my broader community you often see kids are smoking, women being cat-called and parents 'losing' their kids but at Parktown we are united, we protect women and get rid of toxic masculinity.

Every memory is a great one but one that surpasses them all by far is our 'do or die' mentality. I came up with this idea for my last English speech of my high school career. The deeper meaning of this is embroidered on our blazers: the Rampant Lion unlike other lions. A Rampant Lion arises to show courage, determination and wisdom against the challenges and obstacles it is faced with.

As I near the end of Matric, I realise more and more that time really does fly. Each of us must enjoy the Saturday support, enjoy being the rampant lion and enjoy the time we spend here because 5 years is equivalent to 5 minutes. We need to make the most of it and enjoy it while it lasts.

I learnt something else about the 'Heart' of Parktown Boys' High School a few weeks ago. My family and I were shaken out of our humble, but satisfying world when for some unknown reason our accommodation was targeted and it was burnt down - we lost virtually everything. The School and the Parktonian Foundation became aware of this, and Foundation Coordinator Mrs Karen van Huyssteen sprang into action. Within what seemed only a few hours our despair was lifted. The response from Old Boys to Mrs van Huyssteen's appeal for support was immediate.

Not only were our immediate needs like food sorted; within days plans were in place for the materials to be sourced so that our accommodation could be re-built. My family and I have been overwhelmed by these spontaneous and selfless acts of kindness. I would like to thank each of those who contributed so willingly, in whatever small way, to enable us to get back on our feet as a family. You have made such a big difference.

I often wonder where I would be if I never chose Parktown, I guess I will never know. I am proud of the gentleman that the Parktown Family has prepared me to be and as I enter into the 'real world' I will carry on the lessons I have learnt in my time at Parktown.

Most certainly I shall carry with me the powerful concept of 'Brotherhood' - which I now understand more - and the need to be ready to help others when they may be at their lowest.

Parktown Boys' is certainly "A Great Place To Be".

In 2008 my mother and I came to South Africa from Zimbabwe. I don't remember us ever having much but she brought us here with very little to her name and aspirations to find work. From a young age the only memories I have is of me staying at multiple relatives' houses for months or years at a time without my mom; I understand now she was getting enough money and resources to take care of me. I would spend the odd birthday or the odd Christmas with her; my first few memories of such celebratory events was with relatives, but without her. By the time I finished primary school she was able to take care of me, had a secure job as an office secretary in Rosebank and we lived together in a small two bedroom flat with my Arabic stepfather.

Coming into Parktown I hadn't accomplished much in primary school. I did the bare minimum and never lived up to my potential. I was never selected for any leadership roles and the only awards I received was a loyalty scroll for Football and a diploma for a drama competition in Grade 5. At the end of my Grade 7 year I had a horrible incident that put me into a coma and fractured my skull in half. I've always felt as though this was my second chance to try again and to not waste my opportunities but take advantage of them. I was lucky enough to enter a school such as Parktown Boys where I could create a vision for my future and all the resources felt like they were at my disposal to become the man I wanted to become.

In the time I spent recovering from my injuries I participated where I could in the school and found myself in the Choir, Drama Major Production and Photography Club. Coming to the end of my Grade 8 year I was almost fully recovered from my injuries and was able to participate in contact sports again. It was there where I began to explore a range of sports such as Football, Rugby, Rowing and Athletics. It was in Rowing where I have made some of my closest friends and people I am proud to call my brothers.

By 2019 the company my mom was working for fell on hard financial times and had to retrench her. I feared we wouldn't be able to afford Parktown school fees on my father's salary alone so I was looking for a new school closer to home or more affordable. We shared these worries with Mr Stippel and he said some of the best words he has ever spoken to me, "You are not leaving Parktown." He offered me a scholarship that I gratefully took with both hands; this support has enabled me to finish my schooling at Parktown Boys.

Thanks to this opportunity he had given me I have been able to explore my potential more than I would begin to imagine. H. Taking stock

The School's journey over the past few years has required the School to draw heavily on its values, to show its mettle, and to focus on a path of renewal. It has not been an easy time.

In April 2018 a new SGB took office, and in August 2018, Mr Malcolm Williams joined the School as Headmaster, and focused on leading the school in refreshing and accelerating the changes required to the school's processes, structures and culture. The School Leadership Team was very clear in its resolve that the school would own its history and that it would never sweep any issues under the carpet. The school at the time was in the process of healing from the aftermath of the Rex case which saw the school's former water polo coach sentenced to 23 years, in 2018, for a series of assaults on children.

A range of actions were instituted, including the installation of cameras, and anonymous reporting apps, all focused upon ensuring the safety and wellbeing of students and all members of our community.

As we continued on this journey, at the start of 2020, tragically, the School suffered the loss of Enock Mpianzi at our Grade 8 camp.

We acknowledge that these events - though completely separate - rocked the School, and the School's reputation was severely affected. From these painful incidents in the past, the School is in a very different place today. Significant changes have been made in recent





years and the school is noticeably improved, spirit is high and pride has been restored.

These most difficult events have renewed our focus on our Values, and our determination that we continue to develop young men who espouse the qualities of empathy, of care and of compassion for the person next to them - a positive sense of meaningful camaraderie.

These challenging times highlighted that, as a collective (the School and Foundation), we lacked sufficient resources to keep all stakeholders regularly updated. We chose to prioritise the parents, who received regular newsletters and other updates. We acknowledge that many Old Boys had to rely on other sources for information and this created the wrong perception for many. Thus a Key Result Area for us is to improve our communications processes.

There is a treasure chest of inspiring stories that needs to be opened and shared with stakeholders and the public at large. Alumni in the marketing industry have pulled together to formulate strategies, frameworks and capability to ensure Parktown fully reclaims its position as an aspirational brand, a place to belong, and of proud association.

In order to continue its regrowth, to claim and reinforce its rightful place among the prestige schools and to do this in the most meaningful way to the most representative demographic - a microcosm of our greater SA society - Parktown must replace its current financial vulnerability with a stronger situation augmented by the Foundation.

I. The Action Plan

The most notable achievement of the Parktown Trust has been the development of the new boarding house, which was commissioned in 2015 and opened in 2016. The building has been valued at R44 million and is bonded to the tune of R10 million. The bond is serviced through hostel fees paid by boarders. Two personal sureties are in place, both Old Boys of the school. It was through the Foundation also that donor funding enabled the construction of the Sydney Klevansky Sports Centre, and the Surgite House/ Tom Clarke Suite building.

The NPC will now focus solely on fundraising and fund administration.

A stronger school will be able to plan confidently for more expansive investment.

With rejuvenated and ever-improving facilities, the school will be able to widen its base of fullpay parents.

The Foundation will selectively collect urgent funding for specific projects on a pass-through basis and also allocate funds to approved projects recommended by the school's governance structures from an endowment fund, which we shall now begin to accumulate.

The funds shall always be applied for the furtherance of educational outcomes to the benefit of the pupils. Broadly speaking, this falls into three categories:

- Maintenance: functional and aesthetic repairs and maintenance of the school buildings, equipment and grounds
- 2. Capital improvements: new or upgraded facilities required to adapt to the changing education needs of society, for example in robotics and digitisation.
- 3. Bursaries and Scholarships: financial assistance for pupils to cover school fees, transport, hostel board and lodging, sport and cultural tours.

The professionally skilled and diverse board has been formed in the first half of 2022; a full-time Foundation Coordinator has been appointed in August 2022 and the Foundation has officially





been relaunched in October 2022. We have the governance, communication and executive bandwidth to achieve our goals.

It must be noted also that there is now a strong sense of unity in the School. Contrary to the strong sense of division and mistrust amongst all parties that prevailed in the first part of 2018, we now have a School where all key role players are aligned, viz: the Staff and various Parent Support Committees, the School Executive Management Team, the School Governing Body, and the Parktonian Foundation.







J. Closing

As Old Boys of the School who have benefited from the grounding and opportunities provided by the School and still feel a strong affiliation and affection and pride in the establishment, we have repositioned the Foundation and refocused fundraising efforts in order to provide necessary support to Parktown Boys' to restore its reputation and enable it to continue to compete with the best schools in country on all levels, over time. We are determined to ensure the long-term

sustainability of the School as a high-quality educational institution focused on attaining excellence.

We look forward to our next 100 years with confidence and excitement, as we build on the strong foundations of the past 100 years.

2022 Head Prefect Unathi Njenga reflects the energised mindset and expectations in the Student Body currently, in his message to the 2022 Grade 8 Group at their Induction:



Every Parktown Boy's journey begins at this point that you are at: looking at this place that you know very little about, imaging the new strangers you will one day consider your friends. It is the 'blank page' stage; a stage where is there is nothing to your name and you are yet to build a reputation for yourself. So, what you do here at our school matters. Take part in sporting activities; do a cultural activity; try hard at all that you do; all these things will help you write your story here at Parktown.

At Parktown Boys' High School you will be pushed to achieve greatness. A greatness you may not even yet realise is within you. But you will not be alone. You will find yourself surrounded by other great young men, men you will call your brothers. Be there for your friends; support them; grow together with them. Here we are a pride of brothers and brothers are there for each other.
